

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE WITH OPEN PUBLIC MEETINGS ACT

Mayor Fahl led the public in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The City Clerk led the public in a moment of silence in honor of those serving in the United States Armed Forces in Country and Abroad.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mayor Fahl asked for a motion to approved the meeting minutes as listed on the meeting agenda: 12-19-19 Voting Session Minutes, 12-19-19 Closed Session Minutes, 01/07/2020 Reorganization Session Minutes. Councilwoman Taylor made a motion to approve the minutes as submitted. Council President Asaro seconded the motion. An affirmative voice vote was taken in favor of the minutes by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

PROCLAMATIONS

Support for the Celebration of the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage

Mayor Fahl asked for a motion to adopt the proclamation supporting the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage.

Mayor Fahl asked the members of the Governing Body if they wanted to comment. There being no comments about the Proclamation, Mayor Fahl asked for a motion to adopt

Support for the Celebration of the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage WHEREAS, the year 2020 marks the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th

Amendment to the United States Constitution, guaranteeing and protecting women's right to vote; and

WHEREAS, this centennial offers an opportunity to commemorate a milestone of democracy; that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the federal or state governments on account of gender; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey has had a long, storied history in the suffrage movement with New Jersey women playing a crucial role in pursing the rights of women to vote; and

WHEREAS, in 1776 women property owners were enfranchised under the New Jersey State Constitution, which was unique in the nation at the time. However, in 1807, the New Jersey Legislature eliminated the property requirement for voting rights and limited the ballot to white males; and

WHEREAS, in 1867 New Jersey residents Lucy Stone and Harry Blackwell organized the New Jersey Woman Suffrage Association (NJWSA), devoted to gaining women's suffrage; and

WHEREAS, in 1909 New Jersey's first open air suffrage rallies were held in Orange and Newark, led by Dr. Emma O. Gantz and Martha Klatshchken with NJWSA collecting 5,000 signatures for a petition in support of the federal amendment guaranteeing and protecting women's constitutional right to vote; and

WHEREAS, although the 1912 state referendum on woman's suffrage was soundly defeated in the New Jersey Legislature a corner was turned for the New Jersey suffrage movement; and

WHEREAS, in 1913 an automobile rally led by "General" Rosalie Jones traveled through New Jersey on the way to Washington, D.C., in a Suffrage Parade of over 8,000 marchers with many

New Jersey women including event organizer Alice Paul; and

WHEREAS, in 1915 a second suffrage constitutional referendum was pursued in New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts with active campaigns by many suffrage organizations, including the "Passing of the Torch of Liberty" via tug boats on the Hudson River from New York to New Jersey, but was defeated in all four states October 1915; and

WHEREAS, in 1917 New Jersey suffragists Allison Turnbull Hopkins, Julia Hulburt, Beatrice Reynolds Kinkead, and Minnie D. Abbott picketed in front of the White House as part of the Silent Sentinels and subsequently were arrested and imprisoned; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 1919 Congress passed the 19th Amendment guaranteeing all American women the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, on February 9, 1920, New Jersey became the 29th state to ratify the 19th Amendment granting women the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, shortly after the ratification of the 19th Amendment Margaret Laird and Jennie Van Ness were the first two women elected to the New Jersey Assembly in 1921 and in 1925 Rebecca Estelle Bourgeois Winston of Estell Manor was New Jersey's first woman mayor;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, in honor of the 100th Anniversary of the Ratification of the 19th Amendment City of Lambertville will light the Phillip L. Pittore Justice Center, located at 25 South Union Street in purple, one of the colors of the New Jersey Suffrage movement, for the week of February 10; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Lambertville supports the efforts of New Jersey's Suffrage Centennial NJ Women Vote and strongly encourages local celebrations of this historic milestone; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, a copy of this resolution will be forwarded to the Governor, Secretary of State and New Jersey League of Municipalities.

ADOPTED: January 21, 2020

Councilwoman Urbish made a motion to adopt the proclamation and Councilman Sanders seconded the motion. An affirmative voice vote was taken in favor of the motion by all members present. MOTION CARRIED.

World Interfaith Harmony Week

Council President Asaro informed the members of the public present that this resolution was forwarded to the Governing Body from the Human Rights Council and recommended for adoption.

World Interfaith Harmony Week

WHEREAS, recalling its commitment to secure and protect the diversity of the City through educational and other community programs and actions by bringing together multiple facets of the City, along with resident-members, thereby ensuring that Lambertville remains a place of understanding and tolerance; and

WHEREAS, we recognize the imperative need for dialogue among different faiths and religions to enhance mutual understanding, harmony and cooperation among people; and

WHEREAS, we recall with appreciation various global, regional, and sub regional initiatives on mutual understanding and interfaith harmony, including that of the World Parliament of Religions,

WHEREAS, we recognize the moral imperatives of all religions, convictions and beliefs call for peace, tolerance and mutual understanding;

The Human Rights Council of the City of Lambertville hereby proclaims, in affirmation that mutual understanding and interreligious dialogue constitute important dimensions of a culture of peace, and designate the first week of February 2020 as **World Interfaith Harmony Week** - encouraging all people of faith and/or good will to support, between all religions, faiths and beliefs, on a voluntary basis, the spread of the message of interfaith harmony and goodwill in the world's churches, mosques, synagogues, temples and other places of worship, based on love of God and love of one's neighbor OR based on love of the good in people and love of one's neighbor, each according to their own traditions or convictions.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT – Business Administrator

Update on the 2020 Budget Process: Alex Torpey informed the members of the public present that the Governing Body will be focusing on the Capital Budget and looking at revenues, and being mindful of the tax impact on residents and businesses. There is a lot of work going on internally.

Mayor Fahl commented that the Governing Body will be discussing this at the February 4, 2020 work session to dig into our almost \$30 million in Capital Purchase requests for 2020. This is the first time we aggregated those capital cost. It is good to have it all in one place and part of the role of this Governing Body is to triage what those capital requests look like and which ones we can honor.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION/PUBLIC CONCERN

Michael Zareva, a resident of South Main Street was present to voice his concerns over rumors circulating with regards to 'removal' of the speed humps on South Union Street. Mr. Zareva referenced a letter emailed to the Business Administrator today, January 21, 2020. A copy of the letter is attached with meeting correspondence. Mayor Fahl responded that she put in a direct request to remove the speed humps as part of the Capital Budget process. She received several complaints from residents that they don't allow for handicapped vans to drive over them. These have significant road damage where people are grinding the road down because of the angle. Mayor Fahl said she would prefer to have a speed study completed and then figure out the best way to mitigate the issue. Discussion ensued. Mayor Fahl commented that if this moves forward as part of the Capital Budget, it isn't a wildly popular position, but the Governing Body will continue to discuss it. She encouraged Mr. Zareva to continue to attend the meetings of the Governing Body.
